

## Vision and Purpose



Charity established in 2014

- To have zero road deaths and serious injuries on UK roads
- To make UK roads safer by funding practical projects, research, dissemination and education





#### Our total reach so far



- Funded 85 road safety projects
- Awarded over £6.8 million in grants
- Worked in partnership with over 60 organisations our grantees











## How our grant funding works



Currently two rounds of funding available each year

- Themed (Large) Grant programme
  - September/October each year
  - £50K £300K
- Small Grants programme
  - March each year, six rounds so far
  - £10K £50K

# Funding for local projects with a practical focus Focus on trialing, piloting and evaluating

- Innovation but not 'reinventing the wheel'

# We Need To Talk About Hands Free (WNTTAF)




- •£23,898 for 15 months awarded in the themed Small Grants March 2022 round
- Potential displacement effect from handheld to handsfree phone use
- Police officer understanding of the dangers of handsfree phone use
- Police-offender interactions
- Analyses officer attitudes to phone use and their behaviour with offenders
  - Before and after receiving some education on the dangers of handsfree phone use



#### The intervention






#### The intervention changed views



agreed that they understood the research findings	
64%	said they were convinced by the research findings on the dangers of handsfree phone use
77%	agreed that the task was effective in demonstrating the challenges of multitasking while driving
agreed that the activity provided information which could help them in future interactions with offenders	



#### Recommendations



- Establishes the importance of education alongside enforcement
  - Education is needed to inform police interactions with offenders, and messaging shared by forces.
  - Officers should not recommend handsfree use to offenders: compliance with law doesn't equal safety.
  - Wider education (e.g. NDORS courses) should be clear on the dangers of handsfree phone use.





Development of an on-road tractor-based VR assessment and training tool for agricultural drivers



## **Nottingham Trent University**



- In partnership with Farm Safety Foundation
- £49,745 over 1 year
- Develop a validated 360-degree hazard test focused on on-road tractor safety training and driving skills.
- The test will help shift the focus of current safety training from at-work to on-road risk.
- The test will feature key hazards filmed from a moving tractor on real roads.

#### Firstly...

Go to the 'Small Grants' section of our website and download the useful documents

## Tip: Getting started



- Guidance eligibility and assessment criteria
- New online form
- Editable Workbook designed to guide applicants through the process
- Definitions sheet and template to help applicants work through this process
- Examples of how to set out aims and objectives, outputs and outcomes

## Tip: Writing your application



- Clear aims and objectives
- Explain the road safety benefits and how you will measure them
- All projects should involve partnership working and strong project management
- Show the routes to road safety practice and policy, achieving impact and making a difference



#### Tip: Costing your bid



#### DO INCLUDE

- A well costed budget in your application
- Other sources of funding cash or in-kind
- Only direct project costs including staffing
- Monitoring & evaluation and dissemination costs (including evaluation training)

#### DON'T INCLUDE

- Core costs or organisation running costs
- Overheads and indirect costs
- Enforcement equipment or signage costs for standard road safety operations
- Police officer salaries or overtime

#### How and when can I apply?



- Online portal open from 21 March link via our website
  - Paper or emailed applications are not accepted
- New applicants register and set up an account
- Complete a short eligibility quiz
- Portal closes on 24 April at 5pm
- Final decisions by late June 2024
